How Counterpunch Distorts the Truth By Alan M. Dershowitz

Counterpunch editor, Alexander Cockburn, specializes in distortions of reality and half-truths. A recent incident illustrates his mendacious motus aperendi. In an article posted on Counterpunch, former Senator James Abourezk praised Helen Thomas, who was fired from her job for making bizarrely anti-Semitic statements about Jews going back to Europe. In that post, Abourezk also claimed that I "wrote a column in the Jerusalem Post calling [him] an anti-Semite." Anyone who reads the Jerusalem Post article (http://cgis.jpost.com/Blogs/dershowitz/entry/senator_abourezk) can easily determine that Abourezk was lying. My article quotes extensively from an interview Abourezk gave on Hezbollah television in which he accused "the Zionists" of causing 9/11, worldwide anti-Muslim attitudes and picking on the Soviet Union. It is a bizarre and bigoted screed. But in the Jerusalem Post article, I did not accuse Abourezk of being an anti-Semite. He simply lied about that as he has done about so many other things related to Jews, Israel and me.

Rushing to Abourezk's defense, Alexander Cockburn points out that in another article, in a different publication, I added the following paragraph: "It is true that not all anti-Zionism is anti-Semitic, but just because it is anti-Zionist does not mean that it is not also anti-Semitic. If the shoe fits..." Cockburn then engages in a contorted conspiracy theory as to why that sentence was not included in the Jerusalem Post article falsely cited by Abourezk. I tried to clear up the confusion by writing a letter to be published on the Counterpunch website. That website published at least 67 comments mostly critical of me and supporting Abourezk and Cockburn, but Cockburn refused to publish the full text of my letter instead wrenching some words out of context in order to distort what I wrote. Typical of Counterpunch. I attach the entire correspondence so that your readers can decide for themselves whether they can believe anything they read on Counterpunch.

It's a long way from the bad old days when sitting United States senators such as Theodore Bilbo of Mississippi would refer to Jews as "kikes" on the floor of the Senate. Get it? The Jews always need a "boogeyman". They picked the Soviet Union. The Soviet Union didn't pick on the Jews who they were discriminating against and preventing from emigrating. I guess the Jews picked on the Nazis before that.

Then Abourezk gets to 9/11 which he also blames on the Zionists. Listen again:

"Well, because the Arabs who were involved in 9/11 cooperated with the Zionists, actually. It was a cooperation. They gave them the perfect excuse to denounce all Arabs. It's a racist sort of thing, really racist – you know, picking out these 19 to 20 terrorists – they were terrorists – and saying all the Arabs are like them. So, you know, people in America don't really look at it that deeply, and they accept what the covernment and the press are saying."

Stupid Americans! They don't look at it "that deeply." They just fall for whatever the Jewish controlled government and press feed them. What an insult to his former constituents. No wonder he is a former senator.
